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Record High Enrollment

Glenville State College Dean of Records and Admissions Mr. Mack Samples has released the unofficial 1987 spring enrollment figures. The GSC head count is 1,805 - 1152 of which are full time students.

Samples said, "These figures are very encouraging because we had only 1,606 students during the 1986 spring semester - 1,033 were full time."

Samples went on to say, "More interesting is the fact that we have more full and part time students now than we did for the fall '85 semester. Fall head counts tend to run 200 above spring

head counts, normally."

A break-down of the three GSC campuses shows growth at all sites: Main campus - 1320; Parkersburg Center - 243; Nicholas County Center - 386.

When asked to look toward '87 enrollment figures, Samples said that applications for the fall '87 semester are keeping pace with 1986's record number of applicants.

GSC president William K. Simmons found the spring enrollment figures encouraging for higher education at Glenville. He said, "In a time when college enrollments across America are diminishing and West Virginia's

college going rate is the lowest in the nation, I find these enrollment figures to be an encouraging sign. I hope the numbers are up for all of West Virginia."

Samples said the enrollment is the highest spring enrollment in Glenville State College's 115 year history.
