Work Continues on Campus Amphitheater Revamp

Crews have spent the past several months working around the center of campus as upgrades to the Luanna Smith Amphitheater have been taking place. Once completed, plans call for the area to provide more space and expanded pedestrian access.

Glenville State's original amphitheater was constructed in the early 1960s. That space, which spanned most of the hillside behind the Robert F. Kidd Library, had seating for 1,000 and frequently hosted large events and performances in addition to being a popular campus hangout. The area was downsized in the 90s due to drainage issues that had caused portions of the amphitheater to fall into disrepair.

"We expect that this renovation to the center of our campus will be truly transformative and will allow ADA access to the expanded

New VP of Enrollment and Student Affairs Looks to the Future

Earlier this semester, Duane Chapman '93 was selected as the Vice President of Enrollment and Student Affairs at Glenville State University.

In the role of Vice President of Enrollment Management and Student Affairs, Chapman will be working with Admissions, Student Life, and the newly rebranded Pioneer Support Center (formerly the Academic Success Center).

"It is an exciting time at Glenville State University and working with the President and his cabinet moving the University forward in growth and sustainability is an honor and privilege. I am truly excited for the future of GSU," Chapman said.

As Vice President, Chapman says that he feels communication is key and that he hopes to create an environment of buy-in to try things outside of the box and acknowledge when adjustments may be needed.

Chapman also hopes to reinforce a student-centered operational model.

"We cannot say we're student-centered unless we are being student-centered. The student body is the lifeblood of the University and our future. Working with students as a professor or as an administrator is the most rewarding experience when they are successful because of your mentoring or guidance,"

Chapman said. "To achieve this experience, you first have to listen to students and even ask them what support or needs are required for them to be successful."

Chapman has served in various roles at the University throughout the years including Gallery Assistant for Glenville State's Art Gallery, Assistant Professor of Art, Chair for the Department of Fine Arts, Vice President for Enrollment Management, Dean of Student Life, Associate Professor of Art, and Head Boxing Coach. He has also served on various committees and was appointed to the Board of Governors as Faculty Representative in 2023.

He holds a bachelor's degree from Glenville State and an MFA from Ohio University.

Erwin Inducted into Buffalo HS Inaugural Hall of Fame Class

Harold Erwin '65 was inducted into the inaugural class of the Buffalo High School All-Sports Hall of Fame during a ceremony held in October.

Upon graduating from Glenville State College in 1965, Erwin served a stint on GSC's staff as an instructor and as an assistant football and baseball coach during the 1965-1966 academic year. He then went on to receive a master's degree in Physical Education from Marshall University in 1968. Erwin then taught at Buffalo High School for 31 years. He served as Head Football Coach at Buffalo High School from 1972-1976, as Head Track Coach from 1972-1979 and again from 1984-2001, and also was the school's Head Golf Coach for seven years. Coach Erwin ably handled these coaching positions while also serving as Buffalo High School's Athletic Director from 1972-2001 (29 years) and was named to the WVIAC 50th Anniversary All Conference Team.

Hailing from Eleanor, West Virginia, Erwin lettered in football during all four years of his playing career at Glenville State. He was named All-WVIAC First Team in both 1963 and 1964. Additionally, in 1964 he was named All-WVIAC Second Team, and received Honorable Mention NAIA All American. Erwin was Co-Captain of his 1964 Football team. He was inducted into Glenville State's Curtis Elam Athletic Hall of Fame in 2011 and was enshrined into the first

New Bachelor's Degree in Health Sciences Coming to Glenville State

During a meeting in late October, Glenville State University's Board of Governors approved a Bachelor of Science in Health Sciences program. The new program is a reformulation of existing degree programs within the College of Health Sciences to more transparently prepare students for professional degrees. Concentrations within the program include Pre-Medical, Pre-Dental, Pre-Pharmacy, Pre-Physician Assistant, Pre-Physical Therapy, Pre-Occupational Therapy, Pre-Chiropractic, and Pre-Athletic Training.

"I am extremely excited about this opportunity to improve healthcare in central West Virginia," said Glenville State University President, Dr. Mark A. Manchin. "The ultimate goal is to prepare students to continue their healthcare education so that, one day, they will return to their rural communities and serve their friends and neighbors."

The Bachelor of Science in Health Sciences program will be available to students beginning in fall 2025 and is designed to provide a smooth transition into the respective degrees in medicine and allied health. It will provide 44 credit hours of core foundational knowledge in healthcare, 32 credit hours of coursework to meet the typical prerequisite requirements for the specific professional health-related program, and 14 credit hours of electives (general and/or restricted) for any unique requirements and to strengthen their academic preparation.

"Developing this essential pipeline of prepared, driven students into strong graduate-level programs throughout the east coast could change the trajectory of medicine in these rural areas," said Dean of Health Sciences, Dr. Kevin Evans '87.

Glenville State has several memorandums of understanding in place with professional schools in each concentration to ensure that, upon graduating with a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher, GSU students will have guaranteed spots waiting for them. "This fantastic opportunity will not only equip our students and grow the University, it will also make great strides in improving rural healthcare – making quality healthcare available to all West Virginians," Glenville State Provost Dr. Mari Clements added.



Pioneer Football Takes Second Place Finish in MEC

The Glenville State Football team captured their highest finish in the Mountain East Conference after closing out the season with a <u>win over West Virginia Wesleyan College</u> last month. The victory at WVWC brought their season tally to 7-4 overall and 7-2 in the MEC and is the best mark for Pioneer Football in MEC history.

Additionally, Glenville State edge rusher <u>Jamair Diaz</u> was crowned Mountain East Conference Defensive Player of the Year and defensive back <u>Jaiden McLendon Parker</u> was voted Mountain East Conference Defensive Freshman of the Year.

Several Pioneers were also represented on the 2024 All-MEC First Team including Payton Hawkins, Jamair Diaz, and Mark Shepherd, Jr.; the 2024 All-MEC Second Team included Tariq Miller, Isaiah Macklin, Hayden Moore, and Shaun Sterling, Jr.; and the 2024 All-MEC Honorable Mention included Jahzeiah Wade, Justin Collier, Josh Carr, and Brogan Brown.
