Coach Jesse Lilly's Pioneers will clash with the always-powerful W. Va. State Yellow Jackets in the 31st Annual Homecoming game, Oct. 10 at 2 p.m. at Rohrbough Field.

The Pioneers dropped their opener to West Liberty in a mud-slinging battle at Wheeling Island Stadium. The Wave then played their first home game against Fairmont. The Lillymen were a much-improved team over the preceding week, but still lost 19-12.

In last year's contest State handed the Wave a 12-6 defeat. State, Fairmont, and Westminster were the only teams to beat Glenville last year.

After losing two games the Pioneers have built up quite a fire and have stored up a lot of revenge which will be turned loose on Saturday. With this spirit, and a strong desire for a Homecoming victory, the State's Yellow Jackets will know that they are up against a tough conference game.

Lillymen Lose Openers To West Liberty, Fairmont

On Sept. 19 the Glenville State College Pioneers opened the gridiron season with the West Liberty Hilltoppers at Wheeling Island Stadium. The Pioneers played a rough, hard-hitting game and made a fourth quarter bid but fell short 14-12. The White Wave was a two-touchdown underdog going into the game and was relying on numerous freshmen, who turned in a fine performance.

GSC defense was a bright spot in the game. John Lustig intercepted a Ken Hamilton pass on the GSC 47-yard line and threw a lateral pass to Bill Adams, who took it to the four-yard line, but the play was called back due to a penalty. Later in the fourth quarter Larry North plunged through the Hilltoppers' line and blocked a Joe Demko punt.

The White Wave offense was being run by freshman quarterback, Jim Mollohan. In the backfield carrying the pigskin were Joe Duncan, Danny Erlewine, and Stan Boyles.

The Pioneers went scoreless through three quarters of play until John Lustig recovered a Hamilton fumble on the eight yard line. Three plays later fullback Danny Erlewine bulldozed over from the one-yard line for the first time.

A Joe Duncan pass failed to get the extra point. The Pioneers' final score came minutes later in

the fourth quarter. Quarterback Frank Mays passed 32 yards to end Gary Blake. A running play for the extra point was no good.

Face Fairmont State

Glenville lost its second close game of the season on Saturday, Sept. 25 at Rohrbough Field. The Fairmont Falcons booted their way to a 19-12 victory.

The White Wave scored first in the game when quarterback Jim Mollohan danced 11 yards around left end for the score. Jon Lucas kicked the extra point, but it was wide of the mark.

The Falcons then flew into action when, minutes later, Gordon Rennie kicked a 25-yard field goal. To finish the first quarter George Clayton passed 20 yards to Rennie for their first touchdown. The Falcons' kick was wide, making a half time score of 9-6.

In the third quarter Rennie kicked another field goal, this time for 20 yards. Then in the fourth quarter Ron White carried the ball from the three-yard line for the Falcons' final score.

Pioneers' quarterback Frank Mays took to the air in the fourth quarter in an attempt to even the score. Freshman end Harvey Woodson snagged one of Mays' passes for 40 yards and Glenville's final tally.

Members are reminded that anyone wishing to purchase SEA jewelry may do so at the next meeting.


Any student wishing to join SEA should do so at the Oct. 6 meeting.

President D. B. Wilburn Assumes Official Duties

Dr. D. Banks Wilburn officially assumed his duties as President of Glenville State College on Oct. 1.

Dr. Heflin who was president for 17 years resigned the past spring and is now serving as Vice-President of Administration of Finance at West Virginia University.

A native of Jefferson County, Dr. Wilburn grew up in Berkeley County, and was graduated from the area schools.

Dr. Wilburn received an AB degree from Shepherd State College, Shepherdstown. He was later awarded an MA degree from West Virginia University, and an Ed.D. from The George Washington University, Washington, D. C.

The new President spent two years teaching in a rural school in Virginia. For five years he held a position as a principal in Berkeley County. From 1937-1945, Dr. Wilburn was assistant superintendent of schools in Berkeley County.

In 1945, Dr. Wilburn and his family moved to Iowa where he was employed as an instructor in mathematics and education at Iowa State Teachers College. The Wilburns returned to West Virginia in 1947. It was at this time that Dr. Wilburn became Dean of Teachers College at Marshall Uni-

versity, a position which he held until his acceptance of the Presidency.

When he is not busy with academic duties, Dr. Wilburn enjoys playing golf and traveling. Dr. and Mrs. Wilburn have three children and three grandchildren.

Dr. Wilburn says that his first impressions of Glenville state are very favorable. He said that he was "particularly pleased with the fact that the students among themselves are friendly with each other," and he also said "there seems to be a wholesome atmosphere here."

When asked what he thought about construction projects on campus, Dr. Wilburn said, "This is progress; I hope we continue to have progress."

A special all-campus meeting will be held this Friday, Oct. 9, at 10:10 a.m. in the auditorium at which time President Wilburn will officially be introduced to the student body.

ENROLLMENT IS RECORD HIGH

Registrar Beryl Langford announced today that enrollment of full-time students at Glenville State College has increased 15 percent this year over last year's enrollment. In addition to full-time students there are 43 part-time students and 40 students enrolled in extension classes. Registration figures show a total of 1042 students, the highest number in the history of the college.

Most of this year's increased enrollment is in the freshman class. The total of full-time freshmen is 414, compared to 290 last year. The sophomore class is second with 230; there are 178 juniors and 137 seniors enrolled.

There is a slightly greater percentage of men over last year. Of the total enrollment this year 573 are men and 469 are women.
